Keeping company with Dal Richards

A romance that had its beginnings as a friendship at BCIT, 30 years ago.

When you've entertained Vancouverites as one of the city's finest musicians and bandleaders for decades, managed several of Vancouver's top hotels, released seven albums, and travelled the globe what's a fellow to do next?

More of the same!

Dal Richards, a Vancouver icon, has charmed and delighted music lovers since the 1940s. After the advent of Beatle-mania, the big band sound went into a decline and Richards had to reinvent his



career. He entered BCIT in 1966 as the oldest Hospitality student on their roster, at age 48. It was there that he befriended Muriel Honey, an 18-year old Broadcasting student who was working toward a career in radio news.

After graduation from BCIT, Honey's hoped-for news career led her instead to a robust, long-running career in public relations and politics; and Richards ended up back on the music

She was the girl next door, so to speak. In addition to bumping into each other at many of the city's events, Honey's condominium was just around the corner from Richard's penthouse loft on the fringes of the old Expo site. "Let's just say I borrowed one cup of sugar too many," jokes Richards, of their renewed friendship in the late 1990s.

The two of them ended up marrying in 2001 and now their adventures take them on one honeymoon after another (five of them so far). Richards and Honey both have hectic and full work schedules, so the time they manage to spend together is always "a treat," Honey says.

Today, Richards is still one of the City's busiest bandleaders, has a new album in the works, hosts his very popular Dal's Place radio show on 600AM, and coordinates the entertainment line-up at the Pan Pacific Hotel. After a decade of working with successive Vancouver mayors, Honey is now manager of the City's Film and Special Events Office and helps manage Richards' business. They both love their jobs and cite the preparation BCIT gave them.

"I'm still using it," Richards says of his education at BCIT. Honey found that her training in Broadcasting lent itself well to a career in public and media relations.

In their living room, Richard's Honorary Doctorate of Technology from BCIT (1999) hangs on the wall among their many other awards.

But Honey and Richards' biggest accolades seem to be for each other.

Becoming a journeyperson is going to look very different in the years to come. BCIT is working with industry, government and other training facilities to find more efficient and effective ways of delivering trades training.

One of the challenges facing our province is to attract more students to a trades career. A committee has been established to find ways to make it easier for students to pursue their training in this regard. This Transition Advisory Committee will help the province come up with approaches and solutions to replace the current ITAC (Industry Training and Apprenticeship Commission) structure. The entire governance and delivery structure of trades training in the province is being evaluated

and re-designed.

"The proposed intent is to allow people to do the bulk of their training up front, which will reduce the amount of time it takes to become a journeyperson," explains Tony Knowles, BCIT president, who serves on the committee.

"Under the proposed plan students won't have to be employed by industry in order to begin their studies. They would enter as normal fee-payers," Knowles says, referring to the way students in other fields of study pursue their learning.

The idea is for students to take more responsibility for their own training, and to give them a certain degree of control over timing and achievement. Competency-based testing will be emphasized rather than the time they've spent in a trade.



Trades training at BCIT, and province-wide, will be structured quite differently in the years to come.

"Students will have an opportunity to schedule their training when it suits them," says Amanda Hill, Apprentice Service manager for BCIT.

"Laddering opportunities into other credentials will also become easier," she adds.

That means that tradespersons completing a program of studies in a given trade can pursue further studies by linking their previous program to a higher credential - a diploma, or a Bachelor of Technology, for example.

These changes reflect BCIT's comprehensive polytechnic approach to education.

Knowles explains, "By creating as many learning opportunities as possible for our trades students, we are trying to create a closer alignment of the trades with the rest of the Institute's programming."



by its industry partners, for a total of \$59,500 raised in the first year of the program.

"A new member of our Foundation Board, and long-time supporter of trades training at BCIT, David Podmore has shown tremendous leadership in coordinating this contribution to Trades Discovery students. This unique partnership between Concert Properties and other industry members is a significant gift to BCIT," says Laurie Clarke, executive director of the **BCIT** Foundation.

The money will be used to finance entrance awards and grants to students enrolled in two innovative programs offered through BCIT's School of Transportation. The programs help students to evaluate their suitability for working in the trades and determine which trade to pursue. Trades Discovery General (open to men and women) and Trades Discovery for Women are offered on a full-time basis over a 20-week period in each of the fall and spring semesters at BCIT. Students receive hands-on experience in approximately 20 different trades.

The sponsorship program will reward each student that completes the program with a \$200 grant to help recover the cost of enrolment. Those who choose to continue in an eligible BCIT full-time trades program may apply for one of 25 \$1,000 entrance awards.

Lights... Camera... Action!

A remotely controlled fixture mounting system, developed at BCIT, could have an impact on the thriving film production industry in North America.

Film production crews use a variety of light fixtures and dozens of different settings during each day of production. In many cases the fixtures must be mounted high on stands hung from the studio

ceiling, or in an outdoor setting, from a crane or "man lift." Once the fixtures are in place the direction of the light and the shape of the beam is set manually. If a change is required, considerable time can be wasted sending a person up a lift to make adjustments and the exercise may require moving large portions of the set to grant lift access. Each time a fixture is adjusted the risk of a fall injury is also present.

Epic Entertainment Ltd., a supplier of lighting and camera services, contracted BCIT to develop a dependable, fail-safe method of controlling a wide range of lights remotely. Researchers, at BCIT's Technology Centre, designed and built a motorized fixture mounting system that fits the majority of standard light fixtures used by the film industry. This novel design allows lighting crews to adjust flood and spot lights and control panning, and tilting from any location on the set.

The prototype, designed and built to be production ready, is currently in use on film projects within the Vancouver area. The industry response has been very positive. Epic Entertainment is now looking into production alternatives and intends to market the system to the growing film industry in North America.
