General Education Elective Requirements

In addition to the specific courses listed in the program matrix for the Bachelor of Engineering in Electrical Engineering (the Program), students are required to complete one three-credit General Education Elective (GEE) in the areas listed below.

The GEE may be:

- any LIBS course at BCIT that is not part of the program matrix for the Program.
- a non-LIBS course offered at BCIT, or any course offered at another recognized post-secondary institution, as long as there is not undue topical overlap with courses that are part of the program matrix for the Program.

Non-BCIT courses eligible to receive credit as General Education Electives for this program must be:

- in one of the identified disciplines listed above.
- transferable into a recognized Canadian post-secondary degree program.
- taken at a recognized public post-secondary educational institution in Canada.
- assessed to determine transferability into a recognized Canadian post-secondary degree program, if the course has been completed at a college or technical school outside BC or a university outside Canada.

Prior to registering for courses at external institutions, student must confirm with the Program head that the course meets the requirements for an elective course for the degree program.

All non-LIBS courses will be assessed by the Program Head to determine if they meet the requirements for a GEE in the Program. The Program Head reserves the right to make the final decision in cases where ambiguity exists over the level of the course and the number of transferable credits available for the course. Students are strongly encouraged to have this assessment completed before they take the course.

Courses with S (satisfactory) and U (unsatisfactory) grading are not eligible to be the GEE.
