Let the verb show the action: avoid "is able to"

Avoid the phrase "is able to." If necessary, "can" is a perfectly good word to use in its place.

Examples

Instead of:	BCIT is able to successfully manage the necessary course logistics to simultaneously deliver the twelve programs.
Write:	BCIT <u>can</u> successfully manage the necessary course logistics to simultaneously deliver the twelve programs.
Instead of: Write:	The student was able to meet all the competencies of the revised profile. The student met all the competencies of the revised profile.
