

Combat wordiness: avoid ready-made phrases

If you write a phrase you've heard many times before, stop and consider how to say it differently. Ready-made phrases are dull, wordy, and often meaningless. Usually you can replace these weary phrases with one word or discard them.

"at the present time"/"at this point in time"/"as of the moment"	"now," "currently"
"at the same time that"	"while"

"due to the fact that"	"because"
"during the course of"	"while"
"each and every one"	"each one," "every one"
"for all intents and purposes"	discard
"future prospects"	"prospects"
"in all likelihood"	"likely"
"in all probability"	"probably"
"in spite of the fact that"	"although"
"in the event that"	"if," "should"
"in the final analysis"	discard
"in the near future"/"in the not too distant future"	"soon"
"in today's society"/"in this day and age"	"today," "now"
"interestingly enough"	discard
