## Write with precision: "complement" vs. "compliment"

"Complement" means to put two or more things together that enhance each other or complete a set. It also means something that enhances another thing or completes a set.

## **Examples**

The running board is styled and painted to **complement** the truck.

In my previous work experience, I acquired many skills that would <u>complement</u> your marketing team's skills.

BCIT offers a two-year diploma program, a range of continuing education courses, and a growing <u>complement</u> of online courses.

"Compliment" means praise or admiration, or to give praise or show admiration, as in the first two examples below. It can also mean that something is free, as in the last example below.

## **Examples**

In some cases, the courts have <u>complimented</u> the investigating officer on his interrogation skills.

"How to Take <u>Compliments</u>" is the title of a WikiHow.com article regarding gracious acceptance of praise or admiration.

The meet-and-greet has a cash bar with **complimentary** coffee, tea and juice.
